MEMBERSHIP CARDS

Your membership cards can obtain you discounts for purchases from most kite retailers in the UK, and gain you entry to events and festivals free or at a reduced cost. Please keep them safe.

PUBLIC LIABILITY INSURANCE

All fully paid up members are covered by Public Liability Insurance to fly kites safely for pleasure anywhere in the world. If you injure anyone whilst flying your kite the injured party may be able to claim on the club insurance for up to £5,000,000. The club has Member-to-Member Liability Insurance. A claim may be refused if the flier was found to be flying a kite dangerously e.g. using unsuitable line, in unsuitable weather; flying over people, animals, buildings or vehicles. This insurance does not cover you for damage to, or loss or theft of members' kite/s.

BUGGIES, BOARDS & KITESURFING

Unfortunately we are not able to cover these activities within the clubs insurance policy.

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

On peut, coller, souder, ou coudre plusieurs banies de plastique ou de tissu de différentes couleurs.


Les baguettes sont en tourillons de 6 mm. et la transversale de 8 mm. de diamètre.


L'on peut prendre ces baguettes dans du bambou refendu (plus résistant, mais plus lourd).


La quille est cousue à grands points, et renforcée par du ruban adhésif.




6 kite installed in the ceiling at Flux Factory, during the almost something show




Shakib Gunn (right) with Von Tjong on her hand painted Van Gogh's 12 sunflower on a tyvek rokkaku.

Kite Flying for Health and Happiness

5 healthy reasons to go fly a kite.

Flying a kite may be the ultimate carefree pastime. That makes it the perfect metaphor and a fine activity - for health promotion. Some people approach getting healthier as an exercise in self-discipline, a triumph of the will over the sometimes recalcitrant body. Personally, I prefer to see it as an exercise in self-nurturing, a triumph of optimism over the wear and tear of daily life. Of course, adopting a healthier lifestyle takes some real effort and commitment, and it can't always feel easy or fun. But when the enterprise as a whole isn't imbued with playfulness and joy, I suspect that it may be missing the point. What good are a sound mind and strong body without a spirit of enjoyment?

Kite flying is the very definition of sheer fun. For those who need more justification than that, here are five good reasons to do it.

Mindfulness

Mindfulness is a method of paying attention that fosters more acute awareness of the here and now. That awareness, in turn, has a number of proven health benefits, including improved pain management and decreased anxiety and depression. Research h as also shown that it's associated with anatomic changes in areas of the brain involved in memory, learning, and emotion. Watching a kite drift across the sky, it's easy to become enthralled by the present moment, temporarily letting go of yesterday's headaches and tomorrow's deadlines.

Nature

Kite flying is an outdoor activity framed by the great expanse of sky and attuned to the nuances of wind. A large body of research now attests to the mind/body benefits of spending time in nature. While much study has focused on green space, researchers have also begun to look at the restorative power of blue space

in the form of water. From there, it's only a small intuitive leap to the idea that soaking up blue space above the horizon might be beneficial as well. When a kite isn't handy, watching clouds sail across the sky may have a similar effect.

Exercise

Experienced kite flyers say it's a myth that you need to run to launch a kite. The idea is to let the wind do that work for you. But kite flying puts you in an environment that's conducive to outdoor play. Once you've packed away the kite, you might be tempted take a walk, run, or otherwise enjoy the outdoor setting. If you want to raise your heart rate while the kite is still up in the air, try kite boarding.

Preliminary research has shown its value as a cardio workout.

Socializing

While most kites can be flown by one person, kite flying is often done in a group, whether it's simply a fun family outing or an organized festival or competition. As outdoor activities go, it's unusually inclusive, open to individuals of every age, size, and physical ability. A beautiful kite is also a natural conversation starter - an excuse to create happy memories with loved ones or strike up an acquaintance with a fellow kite flyer at the park. Considerable evidence shows that these kinds of social connections are crucial for individual health and well-being.

Beauty

A colourful kite soaring gracefully overhead is a lovely sight. Making your own kite can be an act of artistry. But even the selection of a store-bought kite is a mode of personal expression and a celebration of what's beautiful to you. Think of it as having happiness on a string.



AT A PICNIC




Realising that the "perfect spot" doesn't exist after seven hours of walking, then eating in a lay-by.

Learn to speak dog.





Berrington Butterfly Kite Challenge

The kite challenge at Berrington Hall has become a tradition. There have been many previous events including 'A kite made from recycled materials', 'A kite made from an umbrella' and 'A kite in the form of a letter' (from the alphabet, not a piece of correspondence, you know who you are!)

This year we had to build a butterfly kite. There were a good number of entries and each was built in a different style making it difficult for the judges, Bill Souten and Fred Broadhead.

The judges inspected each kite on the ground and then made sure that each flier could get their kite airborne.



Karl, the reigning champion, brought a rather good Cabbage White which was somewhat more realistic than Paul's 'Tobacco White' (aka Brown) kite built the night before in his tent. Mike's very special Edo-style creation in silk and bamboo certainly seemed to have the most work put into its construction. Roy and Helen seemed to be entering two competitions at the same time with their butterflies seeming to be an ingenious use of recycled parts. Finally Mick brought certainly the smallest kite, only a couple of inches high.


The final decision was made and, for the first time, I was declared the winner with my orange tip butterfly. Although I'm not sure the comment from one of the judges that 'it flew when it looked like it shouldn't' was a compliment.

HERE'S THE FINE PRINT:

- Limited edition printing will consist of 300
 posters to be signed and numbered by the
 artist. Printing and proofing will be the
 responsibility of the kite festival poster
 committee.
- Entries must be delivered to the World Kite
 Museum, 303 Sid Snyder Drive, Long Beach,
 WA by 5pm Monday, January 6, 2020.
- Please include this signed and dated document with your entry.
- Please do not mat or frame your entries.
- It is the artist's responsibility to sign and number the prints as soon as they are received from the printer.
- The Artist will receive 15 non-numbered posters which are not to be available for sale until after the Kite Festival.
- The artist will receive a payment of \$750 payable within 30 days of completion of all signing and numbering of posters. An additional commission of \$2.00 per poster sold through 8-31-18 will be paid by September 15th. The final payment will be made by January 20th. There is no commission due on any poster sold after January 1st.
- The artist may elect to buy any unsold posters after January 1st. The price would be cost plus 10% (cost of poster printing & the tube & caps).
- WSIKF retains the rights to print/publication.
- The artwork shall be: 18 inches high by 24 inches wide or 24 inches high by 18 inches wide.
- The title block will be added by the Kite Festival.
